Graduate Poster Award

A brand new award is making its appearance at SPSP Los Angeles. It showcases graduate student research, features undercover judges, and winners get both recognition **and** a monetary prize.

The criteria for the award are simple. Judges will evaluate applicants based on their written abstract, the quality and clarity of the actual poster presentation, and how well authors respond to questions about their research. What makes this award unique is

that the judges will remain secret until the award winners are named. There will be different judges at each session, representing different levels of career development and this year's award winners will be asked to serve as judges next year.

To be eligible for the GPA, applicants must be full-time graduate students, first author and affiliate members of SPSP. The submission should contain the graduate student's full name, their session and poster number, and university affiliation. The submission may be

no longer than 500 words, and must include 4 separate sections with headings: (1) Purpose; (2) Procedure; (3) Results; (4) Conclusions.

All submissions should be sent to: **spspgsc@yahoo.com**, with the words "poster award" in the subject line. Submissions will be accepted until Dec 5, 2002. One prize and one honorable mention will be awarded at each poster session. More information may be found on the Graduate Student webpage.

Tyrone S. Pitsis University of New South Wales

This ongoing series will feature graduate students randomly selected from the subscriber list of the SPSP Graduate Student Listserv. We hope to profile students with a wide range of interests and experiences.

Tyrone says his program "definitely has a research focus," but that he enjoys the collegial atmosphere and the program's "strong commitment to equipping grad students with teaching skills". His research in particular focuses on the ways in which emotions impact human relationships and the experience of interaction. "Emotions are amazing things and they make us do some pretty bizarre things - yet there is a dearth of research on how emotions effect decision making."

While he started in a PhD program in Marketing, Tyrone eventually decided to pursue a PhD in social psychology. He says he "always viewed research and theorizing in social psychology with great interest and wonder," and that his thinking has been especially influenced by recent work in positive psychology, particularly theorists like Deci, Ryan, Schwartz, Seligman, Csikszentmihalyi, and Myers.

Tyrone is currently a second year graduate student working with Dr. Meg Rohan and Prof. Joe Forgas. He was recently elected Chair of the New Doctoral Student Consortium at the American Academy of Management, and encourages anyone interested in OB or Management to attend their annual conference in Seattle (see www.aom.pace.edu/ndsc for more details).
